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6/7 - Food Nutrition

This term we have been investigating kitchen equipment that we use in our everyday lives, we have been investigating the pros and cons of gas verses electric ovens and stove tops. 6/7 Media Arts

We have been learning about the technical and symbolic elements of Media Arts when discussing and creating artworks of their own. These elements are; composition, space, time, movement, sound and lighting. Students had to demonstrate their understanding of these elements by identifying and discussing these elements within a photograph.



Space (James) - They have made the superheros big and take up most of the space. They are really close together but they do not have a good relationship because they look like there trying to kill each other.

Time (Jarrah) - They are both in the air, moving towards each other with force. You can also tell because the capes are blowing out behind them. I think this might be set in the future because one of them, Batman has advanced armour and a glowing unrealistic stone in his hand.



Composition (Delilah) - Under the mountain there are floating islands and a waterfall. In the picture I see trees with curvy branches and an old rope bridge. They put the trees on the sides of the picture as a border with the red an white castles in the middle of the trees which draws the focus of the viewer to look

Movement (Amy) - The islands might be moving up and down and also the clouds. The bridge might be moving side to side because it maybe windy.



Lighting (Miley) - There is darkness around the walls of the room. At the entrance of the room you can see down the corridor there is some light coming around the corner. It makes me feel excited and mysterious to find out what happens next and what would Indianna Jones do if the trap gets activated.

Movement (George) - The man in the photo is obviously intending to steal the statue as he has a bag and a very concentrated look, so there may a trap about to spring on him.



Sound (Trent) - The natural sounds would be the foot steps and the opening of the box.

Composition (Trent) - They have been placed this way because they have found something mysterious and they look serious. In this image they want you to focus on the object in the girls hand. This has made feel anxious because I am unsure of what is going to happen next.

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
