
This service is free to all South Australian householders and trade painters. The service is supported by Paintback, the City of Port Lincoln and funded by

INSTRUCTIONS FOR DROP-OFF DAY

- · Keep original labels on all containers or put labels on known chemicals.
- Package all materials securely to avoid
- Place old containers in 'suitable' bags or buckets to avoid leaks.
- Place smaller containers in a box or larger container to help with unloading.
- Transport chemicals in your vehicle's boot or trailer for easy and safe handling.
- For your safety please stay in the car and let staff unload waste.
- Please note that no containers or boxes will be returned as we do not empty these

WHAT CAN I BRING TO THE HAZARDOUS WASTE DROP-OFF DAY?

ACCEPTED

- Acids and alkalis
- @ Brake fluids and coolants
- Cleaning products
- Ø Fuel (up to 100 litres)
- Gardening chemicals (including insecticides, rodenticides, herbicides)
- ⊗ Liquid paint (up to 100 litres)
- **Other household chemicals** Ø Paint, varnishes and stains
- @ Pool chemicals
- Solvents (including paint thinners, turpentine)

NOT ACCEPTED

- Ø Ammunition or explosives (contact SA Police 131 444)
- O Asbestos and tyres (contact the EPA 8204 2004)
- Ø Fertiliser (use or donate to local community garden)
- (return to local pharmacy)
- O Household smoke detectors (these can be placed in the waste bin)

The following items are accepted on Saturday 13 May however there are convenient options to recycle these items (see right).

- Fluorescent light globes
- Oil

ALTERNATIVE DISPOSAL METHODS FOR FREQUENTLY DROPPED-OFF ITEMS

Many items people bring to the household hazardous waste drop-off day don't really need to be handled by chemical experts as they are of a less hazardous nature. You can save time by using one of the recycling options below all year round.

BATTERIES

NON-HAZARDOUS BATTERIES (AA, AAA, D) can be recycled at:

HAZARDOUS BATTERIES (lithium, nickelcadmium, mercury) can be recycled at:

quantities will not be accepted.

FLUORESCENT LIGHT GLOBES

A wide range of globes, bulbs, lights and fluorescent tubes can be recycled at:

Residential quantities only, commercial quantities will not be accepted.

Gas bottles can be recycled (fees may apply) at:

- Cooking oil
- 25 cents/litre for all types
- Do not take oily water or coolant

Dry paint is perfectly safe to dispose of in your waste bin – simply tap the hardened tablet of paint out of the tin and place in the waste bin. Empty, dry paint tins can be recycled in the yellow recycling bin.
