## **Context Statement**

Elliston Area School caters for students from R-12. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 72. Elliston Area School is classified as Category 5 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 15% Aboriginal students, 7% students with disabilities, 8% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background. ## **Principal's Report**

Our year began with positive energy and excitement. We introduced 2 new teachers in Annette Hill as our secondary English HASS teacher and Simon Baccanello as our Maths Science teacher. We also welcomed Tracy Sampson to our proficient SSO Team. 2023 saw 2 new reception students begin school for the first time and we were delighted to welcome 7 new students and their families to our community.

We also commenced the year with 4 Year 11 students. In a proven successful local delivery model, we were thrilled to offer Stage 1 subjects from neighbouring schools through the proficient use of technology, and regular visits from teachers to our site and our students to neighbouring schools.

We held SRC elections and presented House captains early in Term 1 as we aimed to develop the leadership qualities of our students in a variety of ways.

Term 1 always brings an array of sporting events with our Combined Swimming Carnival with Lock Area School, followed by the Interschool Swimming Carnival at Wudinna. The Aquatics program delivered by Far West Aquatics is always a highlight, as is the Athletics during the month of March with Sports Day, WCIAC and WASSAC, all of which concluded with gold medals at the Championships in Adelaide for Jarrah Donovan.

NAPLAN was held at the revised time of the year in Week 7, Term 1 and visits from the AFL and SANFL Premiership Cups and Paul Rutter Drawing Workshop together with Brighton High School volleyball clinics were warmly welcomed. We also celebrated Harmony Day, National Ride to School Day and our secondary students catered for the Variety Bash at the oval, raising important funds for their upcoming camp.

Early in Term 2 we held the hugely successful Surf Competition at Walkers Rocks which bought together young surfers and their families from across the West Coast of South Australia. Our staff also held Parent/Student/Teacher interviews with families and communicated the positive learning from the start of the year and outlined goals for the upcoming terms. We also celebrated a Day for Dolly and highlighted the importance of showing kindness to one another.

In Week 3 we were met with the devastation of the traumatic passing of much-loved teacher, Mr Simon Baccanello. This was a time of mourning for our school and our community, with the disbelief of such an event impacting everyone significantly. We wrapped our arms around each other and shed many tears and the resilience and support shown by our students and staff to one another was incredible.

Mr B will always be remembered as a breath of fresh air at our school, as a mentor and friend to our students and as an incredibly giving human whose time with us was only short, but his legacy and the lessons he taught us, will live on in each of us forever.

We acknowledged the one-year anniversary of the passing of Nyah Dudley with a Colour Fun Run to highlight Nyah's colourful personality and love for funky colourful clothes. We unveiled a friendship bench which overlooks our playground area and encourage our students to sit on the bench when they would like to remember the qualities of Nyah or if they are simply looking for a friend to play with.

Our students have endured distressing circumstances over the past 2 years, tragedies no child should have to experience and I am so proud of the way our students are recovering and the way they have supported each other and the manner our staff and community are continuing to remember.

We welcomed Ms Martinus a State Wide PRT to our school to fulfill the Maths and Science classes for the remainder of the Term and delighted to have Heather Wright pick up HPE lessons one day a week.

Our students participated in a meaningful Reconciliation Week activity which included a surfboard fin art display and cooking on an open fire as we discovered more appreciation for the Indigenous culture. We also hosted a visit and science activities from Questacon, held a Be Kinder Day and created some fun and excitement at the Disney Disco. The term was rounded out with NAIDOC Week celebrations with traditional cooking and the artistic creation of a colourful Wedge Tailed Eagle.

Term 3 created a fresh start with a reshuffle of staff. Mr Adams took on the Maths Curriculum and Heather Wright continued with her delivery of PE lessons to our middle primary and secondary students.

This was also an exciting time as we were gifted a Wellness Dog from Adelaide Hills Groodle and we introduced Haze to our school and community. Haze has been a wonderful addition and with the support of the Dog's Connect program, has settled into his new role of bringing joy and peace to our school. We also began the Open Parachute Wellbeing Program throughout the school which has had an encouraging effect by equipping our students with skills and knowledge through an array of positive mental health strategies.

Students were involved in Book Week Celebrations, sports such as, 9 a side football and SAPSASA and participated in thrilling Science Week activities full of hypothesis and experiments. Our secondary students attended a Far West Camp complete with excitement and energy, and our school transitioned to a new Education Management System. Excursions were also a highlight and it is wonderful to see our staff engaging our students with an array of out of classroom learning experiences.

Term 4 began with the coming together of weeks of planning and preparation as our school held the 43rd Wool Show. Accompanying this event was our Annual Learning Expo which had a magnificent display of student work and activities in the Hall, together with our Wool. The Woolshow itself was again a spectacular occasion meticulously organised by Julie Tree and supported by our Governing Council. This year we saw new events such as the wool bale rolling, lego and sweet competitions, along with old favourites of the boot and rolling pin throw, jumping castles, bubble soccer and the ever-popular Show and Shine Car competition. We are enormously grateful to our farming families for their donations of wool, local businesses, stall holders and generous sponsors for their support of the event and of course, our school families who all contribute to the success.

We welcomed Jay Dudley as the 4/5/6 Teacher for Term 4, who was supported by Rosie Romanowycz on Friday's. Students continued to be engaged with camps and excursions and school events throughout the Term such as, cricket and basketball competitions, the Variety Club Christmas Party, PE excursion to Port Lincoln, Indigenous performance and the Streaky Bay School formal. We also held a successful Careers Week where parents and community members visited our school and spoke to the students about their current career and the journey they have taken.

The year concluded with a spectacular Presentation Night where each class presented a showcase of performing arts and students celebrated the year with a fun and exciting Activities Week.

The emotional year enabled us to reflect on the attributes of our school and the people within it which make it a truly special place to learn and work. Thank you to our students and staff for a wonderful year and we all appreciate our school families and the wider Elliston community for your support throughout 2023.





## **NAPLAN Proficiency**







## **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or nongovernment school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
